



LETTER FROM THE SECTION 5A VICE-CHIEF

Dear Brothers:

As members of Octoraro 22 you have a double responsibility. First and foremost, you are charged with making the lodge strong, and responsive to the needs of the scouting movement in Chester County. This is done through work on the Executive Committee, work projects at camp, and other year wide projects.

When this first responsibilty is met and Octoraro Lodge is strong, the second responsibility is also met, that of supporting Section 5A, without strong lodges willing to help each other, the Section would be in serious trouble.

The section is involved in many things who's purpose is to help lodges and bring them closer together in the brotherhood. This year the Section Chief Jerry Coombs and I hope to do just that.

At the first Council of Chiefs meeting in October the groundwork was set for a productive year. Service Weekend Registration

At the past few ordeals some people have not been pleased with their jobs or project. If you will read these next few lines they may help you in not only your job selection but also in getting a project you like.

In getting your job assignment you have a choice of approxamatly 25 jobs which range from being a waiter to cutting firewood. When you have reached a decision of your three favorite choices of jobs, John Ellison and his project committee will try to give you your first choice. In some cases jobs are changed in order to provide leadership (in the case of adults) or manpower (in the case of boys). Approxamatly 90% of the membership gets their first choice.

In the planning of jobs and work assignments service weekends at the Horseshoe and Jubilee camps, the projects committee must consider three service areas: Lodge projects, Camp Jubilee and Camp Horseshoe projects, and the jobs relating to the operation of the weekend. A few members have indicated cocern about an uneven distribution of workers between the two camps. We would like to piont out the fairly even spilt of manpower after you deduct manpower assigned to OA related jobs, examples: cooking crew, waiters, lodge building, lodge records. headquarters and OA supplies, OA bridge, and a very large OA Circle crew. Most of the time job requirement and first choice applicants come out even, however there are a few jobs each weekend which requires additional manpwer. The additional manpower is often made up from those who check off (will work anywhere) or those who registered late. However shortages sometimes necessitate placement by second choice.

A last point that John would like to share with you concerning the response to a few adults who have mentioned the fact that they have brought tools for one job and then assigned to another job. Well, the project committee has ALWAYS given job preferance to those adults who kindly furnished special tools. In the future if you are bringing tools on a service weekend you may call it to our attention by writing a note on the back of your card.
