EDITORIAL

When E. Urner Goodman created the Order of the Arrow, it was intended to be an extension of and a supplement to the Boy Scouts of America program, and as such, was meant to be operated under Lord Baden Powell's system of Boy Leadership. Now, although to some this may seem to be a contradiction of terms, the BSA has been going over three-fourths of a century, and isn't showing any signs of quitting yet!

The key to the success of the Boy Leadership in Boy Scouts is the level of interest shown by the youth. Alas, this is not the case in Octoraro Lodge 22. The boys of the Executive Committee, who ought to be leading the way and taking initiative for decision making, are content to rely entirely upon their advisors, submitting department reports such as "All went well," or "No report." Thus the adults are forced into taking an active role to make up for the ineptitude of the Boy Committee, rather than remaining in advisory positions as outlined by E. Urner Goodman.

The solution to this problem is twofold. Firstly, on the part of the regular attendees of Lodge Function. These are the "Educated Voters" of Lodge #22, and it is they that choose the Committee Officers who serve on the Executive Board. It is up to these voters to choose a candidate with zeal and initiative. One who has the motivation to take matters into his own hands, rather than allowing others to decide for him is what we want. Secondly, the responsibility is with the candidates themselves. Members should not offer themselves as candidates merely to win Vigil Honor Nomination. Instead they must be willing to serve and to take an active interest in their duties, thereby bringing new bite into the lodge.

Although activity and intesest in the lodge has been waivering in recent years, new energy could revitalize us and get all of the members of the lodge involved. Youth involvement is the cornerstone of a successful boy-run organization, and with a revitalized group in the Executive Committee and in the Lodge activities, we can make the Lodge of Octoraro flourish.

IMPROVE CAMPING IN YOUR TROOP

Does the camping system in your troop seem to be lacking in any respect? If this is true, this article may help to revitalize it. There are certain problems that cause this condition, but solutions can always be found to solve them.

Often, a troop's camping equipment becomes weathered, out-dated, broken, or just worn out. When this happens, a fund raiser is needed to create money to repair or replace the equipment. Fund raisers like hoagie sales, candy sales, or raffles are all good easy money-makers. Once you have accumulated enough money, shop around and look for the best buys on the things you need. This may help to solve your problem, but often it is only one step in the right direction. Another problem facing your troop may be the lack of enthusiasm and attendance at your meetings. In order to keep scouts interested and excited, trips must be made to places that the scouts will enjoy and if possible, to new places. These outings must be well planned and the plans should always be carried out. If possible, always visit the sight to get a preview of the trip.

Planning is the most important part of any trip if you want it to be successful. Several weeks before the trip, plan a well-balanced menu and know how it is to be cooked. Also, have a schedule or calendar of events for the trip so that the boys can know what to expect. Without proper preparation before a trip, the chances of success diminish.

Camping is one of the most important things in scouting. Without it, the boys in your troop will not get to experience the great outdoors to its greatest potential. The most important thing to remember when camping is: Enjoy the outdoors!
