

HISTORY OF OCTORARO LODGE

In 1915, E. Urner Goodman, director of the Treasure Island Camp of Philadelphia Council, organized the Wimachtendienk W.W. as the highest of camp honors. Each troop chose a scout who was then inducted into what was the beginning of our Order. Other nearby councils soon heard of this camp honor group and sought information from Dr. Goodman.

In the next few years, more honor groups were formed, and in 1924 Charles M. Heistand, then Scout Executive of the Chester County Council, B.S.A., wrote to the National Chief for information regarding this newly formed organization, now known as the Order of the Arrow. He became interested in the program through Mr. Horace Kern, Scout Executive of

the Philadelphia Council at the time.

The charter for Lodge #22 was approved on May 17, 1926, and nine candidates were received into the Lodge at a ceremony of induction held at Hilldale, weekend campsite of the Chester County Council. This camsite was located at the site of an old paper mill along the banks of the Brandywine Creek, west of the County seat of West Chester. The nine charter members of the new Lodge were given their induction by E. Urner Goodman, founder of the Order and Scout Executive of Philadelphia Council. Later that same year an additional class of 41 candidates was inducted at Pine Grove Furnace in the South Mountains of Pennsylvania, known as Camp Rothrock.

Many of the Lodge members have done service to the Order in a capacity greater than that of a Council level. Three charter members have gone to a National Level. Chief Hebstand continued in professional Scouting, and served on the National Order of the Arrow Committee and as Assistant Chief Scout Executive. Joseph H. Brinton, our Lodge's first Sakima was elected National Chief in 1937 and went on to serve on the National Committee until 1948 when he too entered professional

Scouting.

In 1929, Benjamin Thomas was appointed Grand Chief to study and improve the rituals by infusing more real costumes and lore.

On a more local level, Ronald Sykes served as Area Chief in 1952 and former Scout Executive Louis Lester served as advisor to the original Area E Fellowship Conferences.

The Lodge name "Octoraro" was chosen after the Council established the present camp in 1928 along the Octoraro Creek, near Rising Sun, Maryland, Octoraro, a word of Lenni-Lenape origin, was the name given to the fast stream which forms a horseshoe around the original farm and camp; long before white men settled in the area. After a heavy rain in that section of the country, the stream would rise so fast and become so muddy, that it was well known among the Lenni- Lenape and others as Octoraro or "Muddy River" . By contrast, however, over long periods of good weather, indians and others traveled many miles on foot and on horseback to fish in this stream. then, as now, known for its fine fishing.

In 1934, the National Council approved the Order of the Arrow and again in 1948 the National Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America, upon recommendation from its Com mittee on Camping, approved the complete integration of the Order of the Arrow into the Scouting program. This month's installment deals with our own Lodge's flaps. Octoraro Lodge has issued many flaps in its 46 year history, there are 11 in all.

The first of the pocket flaps was issued in 1958. It depicts a white goose flying in the blue skies of Camp Horseshoe. The border is green, symbolic of the many woods and trees at Horseshoe, and the lettering is red and white. This patch is commonly referred to as the "cut edge blue".

The next patch was issued in 1963 and is basically the same as the first except that it is not as wide, and the blue background is slightly different. The goose is also slight-

ly changed.

There is an interesting story behind the next three flaps. which tends to confuse the untrained eye. The first has a red border with a yellow background standing for the muddy Octoraro Creek; a black horseshoe representing the Reservation; and a white, migrating goose flying through it. The second is similar in all respects except that it has the words "Chester County Council" across the bottom. The third is identical to the second except in the Chester County Council. The lettering in all three is red. Pick up the difference between the second two? The only one is that the first carries "Chester County Council" with the quotes, while the second has the quotes removed. Interesting isn't it. The story is that the first set was ordered without the Council name, then, on the second order, the patch company was instructed to add "Chester County Council" and they did just that, quotes and all! On the next order, the correct flaps were obtained. This was the story given at the time, but from time to time, there have been some who have doubted its validity. These patches were issued in 1964, 1965, and 1966 respectively.

In 1968, another patch was issued which differed from the last only in that it had a black border.

In 1969 another patch was issued, changing only the color of the nails in the horse-

shoe, from black to white.

The eighth flap proved to be a replica of the second patch issued, that is blue with a green border. However, in this edition the goose was shorter and fatter and the colors are a shade different. In addition, the overall size is a bit smaller.

In 1971 the ninth flap was issued. It is the silver bordered, multi - colored patch which is now our official Lodge flap. Because of the beauty of this flap, it has proven to be a hot trading item in the short time since its issue.

The tenth flap issued was a red bordered edition with white nails in the horseshoe. It is somewhat similar to the earlier red borders.


The eleventh and nost recent issue is another patch company "mistake". It is an exact reprint of the two black bordered issues except that the nails in the horseshoe are red!!!! Come on mysterious mistake maker, whoever you are, who ever heard of a horseshoe with red nails????? In the opinion of the Octoraro Trader, this idea of slight variations has gone a little bit too far.


