SUNDAY LUNCH SPARKS GREAT DEBATE

Brothers show their opposition to the removal of Sunday meal

Friday, April 23, 1993, nearly one-hundred brothers gathered in the Dining Hall at Camp Horseshoe for a council discussion period. The topic that night was the removal of Sunday lunch from the camp program that summer, and Tom Darlington represented the council. It didn't take long for the topic to heat up, as the majority of those who voiced their opinions were completely against the change. "My troop comes down here for two weeks," said Ernie Heegard, the past Lodge Advisor and current Scoutmaster of Troop 78 in Willistown, PA, "and part of what they pay for is Sunday Lunch. Now that they've already paid their money, which is higher than last year, you remove part of the program? It's the old bait and switch, if you ask me."

The reasons given by the council for the change included giving the Camp Staff a rest period and to help alleviate traffic jams that frequently occur along the camp road on Sunday afternoon.

Several Brothers replied to this reasoning by saying that we should be thankful that there are traffic jams. Some other Brothers were scared that Sunday lunch was just the beginning of even deeper cuts in the camp program. But, the main reason people are against the change is that Sunday lunch is an integral part of the camp program. "Sunday lunch is the climax of the camp week. Campers go home with a positive experience on their minds. Eliminating lunch sends them home in the wrong state of mind," said a council staffer.

However, campers can rest easy this summer, for Sunday lunch has been reinstated, only this time as *Sunday brunch*. A continental breakfast will be served at 7:30am in the campsites, Church will be at 8:00am, campsite pack-up at 9:00am, and brunch, with all the songs, awards, and honors of Sunday lunch will be at 10:15am. Troops will depart camp at 11:30am, well before the incoming troops arrive at 2:00pm. Hopefully, this change will satisfy all parties, and will make for an enjoyable summer.

Kituwah is a gathering of indian nations in celebration of Native American life. Kituwah is a daylong event held in Asheville North Carolina where vistors can enjoy Native american music, dance demonstrations, story telling, crafts, and food. Winter Camp Staff

It's that time again, time for winter camp staff. With that we need fellow brothers from our troops to help staff the OA lodge and put on a program for the winter campers at Horseshoe. Winter camp staff requires two adults, a program such as knot tying, fire building, or a hobby, as well as a Sunday church service.

Winter camp staffers arrive at Horseshoe Friday night and check in with the Camp Master in headquarters who will let you into the OA lodge. That night let yourself be known to the troops in camp that weekend because otherwise no one will use your program. Saturday morning, set up your program and present it to the troops who stop in. Saturday night, organize a campfire involving the troops who are in camp. Sunday morning, invite all the troops to a church service. Afterwards, clean up the lodge, check out with the Camp Master and leave knowing you had contributed to the success of our lodge.
